Pastor's Message



Dear Friends:

How I wish I could have been a fly on the wall when Mary Magdalene and the disciples had their first encounter with the Risen Lord. Their lives were in shambles. The one they loved and followed for three years, the one they knew as Teacher and Messiah, the hope of Israel, had been crucified and laid in a tomb. It was all over. They were lost, defeated, scattered, and full of fear that they were next.

Yet they see him. Of all the disciples, Mary Magdalene was the first to see him. Such was the depth of her friendship with Christ that a woman would be the first witness to the resurrection. It is not obvious to her at first glance that it is Jesus.

She mistakes him for the gardener, a direct reference to the Garden of Eden (although they encounter each other in a cemetery) and to Jesus as the new Adam. He calls her by name and she recognizes him.

Then he appears to the disciples in the Upper Room, coming through the wall, basically, and they take him for a ghost. Yet he can eat a piece of fish and he breathes on them, a direct reference to God breathing the breath of life into Adam, and now Jesus bringing the Holy Spirit to recreate his disciples. He clearly has a body in which his wounds are visible, yet it is luminous, powerful, and without the normal limitations of space and gravity.

Of course, there is no way to describe the wild and immense joy of those who saw Christ on that Easter morn. In him we see that the first act of the new creation was the resurrection. We await a new heaven and a new earth, and I would not be surprised if the new heaven is this earth perfected, where we finally live as God intended for all time. No one really knows what God has in store for us, but stay tuned. It will be quite the show!

One thing is clear, we no longer need fear death, which is our greatest fear and is really the ground of all our other fears. Death is now simply the doorway to our true home. When we die, we will not become disembodied spirits floating in the air or angels with wings. We shall become like Christ, for we shall see him as he is. We will have resurrected bodies, luminous, powerful, eternal, and we shall never taste death again. Then we shall see the glory of God in the heart of every person created by God. Why wait until the end to see it? How different our world would be if we could perceive it now.

I love these words of Thomas Merton that capture for me this core mystery. "At the center of our being is a point of nothingness which is untouched by sin and by illusion, a point of pure truth, a point or spark which belongs entirely to God, which is never at our disposal, from which God disposes of our lives, which is inaccessible to the fantasies of our own mind or the brutalities of our own will. This little point of nothingness and of *absolute poverty* is the pure glory of God in us. . . . It is like a pure

diamond, blazing with the invisible light of heaven. It is in everybody, and if we could see it we would see these billions of points of light coming together in the face and blaze of a sun that would make all the darkness and cruelty of life vanish completely."

Amen. Come, Lord Jesus!
