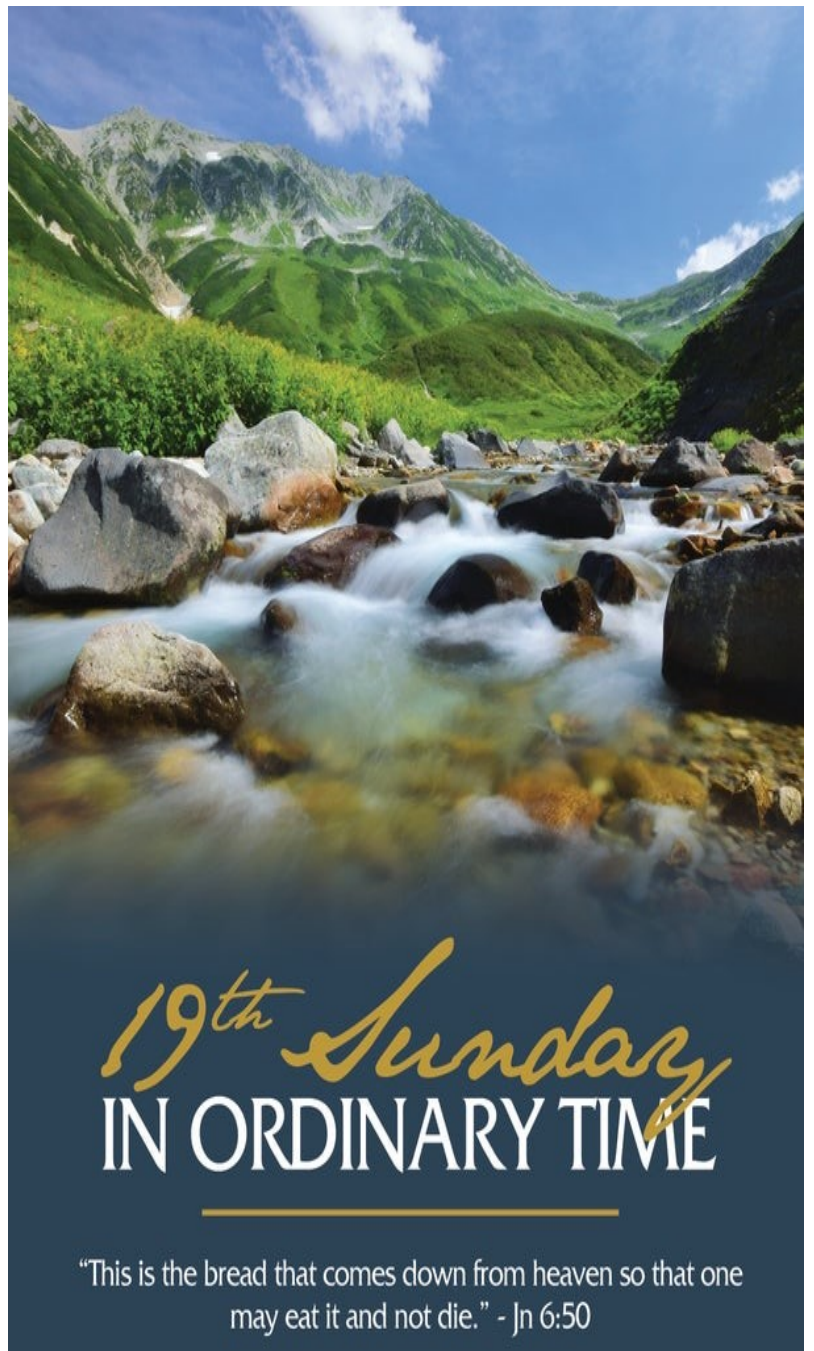

EMERGENCY FOOD ASSISTANCE

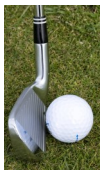

Pastor's Message



Dear Friends:

Some of you are aware that on July 16 Pope Francis reimposed restrictions on celebrating the Latin Mass that Pope Benedict had relaxed in 2007. Pope Francis said he was taking

action because Pope Benedict's reform had become a source of division in the church and been exploited by Catholics opposed to the Second Vatican Council, the 1960s meetings that modernized the church and its liturgy. Pope Benedict had issued his document in 2007 to reach out to a breakaway schismatic group that celebrates the Latin Mass, the Society of St. Pius X, and which had split from Rome over the modernizing reforms of Vatican II.

Pope Francis said he was taking action to promote unity and heal divisions within the church that had grown since Benedict's 2007 document, *Summorum Pontificum*. *He said he based his decision on a 2020 Vatican survey of all the world's bishops, whose "responses reveal a situation that preoccupies and saddens me, and persuades me of the need to intervene." Basically, Pope Francis was sending a strong message to those Catholics who reject Vatican II and assert that it betrayed the tradition of the true Church.*

Under the new law, Pope Francis has restored the obligation for priests to have their bishops' permission to celebrate the 1962 Latin Mass. Bishops must also determine if the current groups of faithful attached to the old Mass accept Vatican II, which allowed for Mass to be celebrated in the vernacular rather than Latin. These groups cannot use regular churches; instead, bishops must find alternate locations for them without creating new parishes.

In addition, Francis said bishops are no longer allowed to authorize the formation of any new pro-Latin Mass groups in their dioceses.

As you can appreciate, many in the Church, including the bishops, are seriously divided on this issue. Traditionalist Catholics are particularly furious with Pope Francis for the suggestion that they are divisive or unfaithful because of their love of the 1962 Latin Mass. Yet other Catholics feel that Pope Benedict's loosening of regulations against the Latin Rite allowed others to use it for division.

The deeper issue for me concerns a growing division and polarization within the Catholic Church in the United States. The best definition I ever heard of the Church was, "Here comes everybody!" Throughout the centuries, we have found ways to hold the center and to prevent the Church from splitting into factions that would greatly weaken the life and witness of the Church.

As far as our parish is concerned, this issue does not directly affect us. Nonetheless, we pray urgently for greater unity in the Church. If our witness to Christ as Catholics depends on the practice of "See how they love one another," it seems that there is cause for serious concern here.
