

HOLY REDEEMER'S SVDP CONFERENCE

"Giving help and hope one person at a time." The Society of St. Vincent de Paul was founded by a small group of students in Paris in 1835 and now stretches across the globe. Its namesake and patron saint was a sixteenth century priest from Pouy, France who became known as the "Father of the Poor." The Society was unique for its time in that it was formed by lay Catholics, and it offered charity to foreigners as well as non-Catholics. A truly Christian enterprise! Our

conference at Holy Redeemer seeks to reflect this Vincentian spirit through our rent and utility assistance program as well as a food pantry, all staffed and funded entirely through volunteers. Our pantry receives food from the parish as well as partner agencies such as the Oregon Food Bank, Safeway, and Nite Hawk Cafe & Lounge. Each conference is governed by a Board of Directors which includes a spiritual advisor and is overseen by the Portland District Council <u>www.svdppdx.org</u>. Dear Friends:

When we think of how God decided to come to earth, it isn't how any of us would have planned it. The angel Gabriel addressed Mary as "You who are highly favored," but as a teen mother, pregnant before marriage and destined to give birth among barn animals, she might be forgiven for regarding this greeting with a certain sarcasm.

The whole Christmas story is enigmatic: the Creator pulls on a garment of blood

and bone. Almighty God is somehow present in a fragile newborn. The deliverer of humankind is delivered in a place smelling of dung. It makes us realize that if God came here, he has come everywhere.

While people understandably looked to a Messiah to liberate Israel from Roman oppression, the birth of Jesus asserts that the most important things are not political or social but personal and human. God is not bringing us a new way of organizing society but a new way of being human, marked by compassion, dignity, and kindness. Politics has its place, but the greater priority is to honor God's image now present in every human life.

As author Michelle Kondrich puts it, "In the scriptures, Jesus is given the name Emmanuel, which is Hebrew for 'God with us.' He entered the bowels of human existence for the sake of every human soul. The implications are remarkable. It means that there are no insignificant or pointless lives. It means that the events and choices of an average day carry eternal significance. It means that a journey of meaning and purpose—a life of courage and generosity—can begin from whatever desolate place we find ourselves."

It is good to be reminded that even lives that seem completely ordinary, or lives that seem hopefully broken, carry some deeper divine purpose. We are embraced, loved, elevated, and dignified by a God who became humble enough to share our human condition.

And it should remind us that no matter what happens, God is with us. If we have a loved one with a chronic illness like dementia, a shattered relationship, some kind of personal or professional failure, ongoing depression or anxiety, or the tragic loss of a family member, God is with us. In life and in death, God will never leave us or forsake us.

We place our faith in this extraordinary person whom we receive in the Eucharist and who dwells within us and within every human being. Our faith does not promise us release from suffering but it can bring release from fear.

In the poetic words of Michelle Kondrich, "The hope that began at Christmas Day still shines like a star and swells like a song, carried across the centuries by chanting monks and gospel choirs, filling great cathedrals and revival tents, but clearest in the quiet of our heart: God is with us."
