

HOLY REDEEMER SVDP CONFERENCE

As of 1/13/2021, we've served 22 families with \$2,985.00 in food/utilities/rent. Holy Redeemer church/school donated 227 lbs. of food and volunteers offered 39 hours of time. Thank you for your ongoing love and sacrifices.

RENT & UTILITY ASSISTANCE

We are able to provide emergency rent and utility assistance-for those facing utility cutoff or eviction. Assistance is provided to registered parishioners and households within our parish boundaries (N. Alberta to the Columbia River and N. Denver to NE 26th Ave.). We are able to provide this assistance due to the generosity of parishioners. The Oregon Community Foundation grant program is closed at this time.

EMERGENCY FOOD ASSISTANCE

HR's SVDP Food Room (back side of church, basement level) is open every Wednesday and Saturday, 2:30 - 4:00 PM. Anyone in need of emergency food is encouraged to go to the food room during these hours of operation to be given emergency food. All requests are treated confidentially. All visitors must wear masks.

SVDP PANTRY NEEDS: Fresh eggs, canned meals/meats/tuna, peanut butter, jelly, cereals & fresh fruits. Please drop them off in the parish office. *Thank you for your help.*

NEW MASS ATTENDANCE GUIDELINES

Governor Brown announced new coronavirus guidelines on November 25. Faith institutions will be limited to a maximum of 25% capacity or 100 people indoors. With our current capacity and physical distancing requirements, we will be able to accommodate up to 22 groups of people, not to exceed 100 people total per Mass.



ASH WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 17, 2021

Due to the pandemic, ashes will not be imposed on people's foreheads this year to avoid any possible transmission of Corona Virus 19. Instead, for those who wish to receive ashes on Ash Wednesday, the Archdiocese has directed us to sprinkle the ashes upon a person's head. In ancient Jewish custom and during the time of Jesus' life, the sprinkling of ashes was a sign of sorrow and sadness. And so, for this year, we'll use the blessed ashes in this way as we "Repent and believe in the Gospel!"

On Ash Wednesday, there will be two Masses offered at Holy Redeemer: 12:00 pm Noon (English) and 7:00 pm (Bilingual)

Pastor's Message



Dear Friends:

As I write this, I'm smiling because of the recent visit of our kindergarten students to the church. They came for a guided tour with me as the guide. In preparation for their tour of the church, they had studied a little booklet that highlighted the sacred vessels and objects used at Mass. The children also had questions that their teacher had written down for them to ask me.

They entered the church with eyes of wonder visible above their masks, looking around at everything. They were very respectful and polite throughout the tour. I started at the baptismal font, explaining that it's located near the entrance, because baptism is the door through which we enter the faith. I then explained the Paschal candle and the symbols on it, and then took out the three holy oils. I then poured some of the Chrism oil, with its aromatic balsam, into a small bowl, and one-by-one they took turns sniffing it. They seemed to enjoy it.

Then we moved to the front of the church and looked at our beautiful stained glass windows. They had no trouble identifying Mary in the three stained glass windows above the confessional. I did have to explain the reason why Mary is stepping on a green snake with an apple in its mouth, so I tried my best to tell the temptation story from Genesis, and how Mary is portrayed as the new Eve, the maiden who said "yes" instead of "no" to God.

Then we stepped up towards the altar area. They looked at their booklets and I held up or pointed out all the things highlighted there: the ambo (pulpit), the altar, the chalice, hosts, church candles (51 percent beeswax), and the processional cross.

I then demonstrated how to light the charcoal briquette used for incense. Even as an altar boy, I was fascinated by how the briquette, once lit, sparks from one end to the other until fully lit. They weren't too keen on breathing in the smoke but did agree that the incense had a most pleasing aroma.

The highlight was certainly all the questions they had prepared. One child asked what priests do every day? I was tempted to say that we play video games but tried to answer satisfactorily. Another asked about whether we had a lot of funerals and if anyone had died lately. They also wanted to know where Fr. Michael and I lived. So we had a quick tour of the office area in the rectory and of our dining room and kitchen downstairs.

I was reminded that Jesus once said that you must become like little children if you wish to enter the kingdom of God. These young visitors reminded me of how we should all be: open, gentle, full of wonder, free of prejudice, filled with love, with a simple and natural faith in God. Jesus said that their guardian angels contemplate the very face of God. How much we need their witness to human goodness and joy in these troubled times. I hope they enjoyed the tour as much as I did.
