HOLY REDEEMER'S SVDP CONFERENCE

"Giving help and hope one person at a time." The Society of St. Vincent de Paul was founded by a small group of students in Paris in 1835 and now stretches across the globe. Its namesake and patron saint was a sixteenth century priest from Pouy, France who became known as the "Father of the Poor." The Society was unique for its time in that it was formed by lay Catholics, and it offered charity to foreigners as well as non-Catholics. A truly Christian

enterprise! Our conference at Holy Redeemer seeks to reflect this Vincentian spirit through our rent and utility assistance program as well as a food pantry, all staffed and funded entirely through volunteers. Our pantry receives food from the parish as well as partner agencies such as the Oregon Food Bank, Safeway, and Nite Hawk Cafe & Lounge. Each conference is governed by a Board of Directors which includes a spiritual advisor and is overseen by the Portland District Council <u>www.svdppdx.org</u>. You are more than a choice. So are we. We're someone's son or daughter, grandchild, sibling, niece or nephew, cousin, friend, co-worker, neighbor. Many of us are someone's spouse, someone's parent.

Abortion Survivor

In 1977, Melissa's biological mother was a 19 year old college student when she had a saline infusion abortion that was meant to end Melissa's life. Although her biological mother thought that she was less than five months pregnant when she had the abortion, the fact that Melissa survived and weighed almost 3 pounds indicates that her biological mother was much further along in her pregnancy than she realized. In fact, when Melissa obtained her medical records in 2007 that detail the abortion procedure that she survived, one of the first notations by a doctor after she survived was that she looked like she was approximately 31 weeks gestation! Despite the initial concerns that doctors had regarding her ability to survive, and the quality of life she would experience if she did, today Melissa is a healthy 34-year-old woman.

Although Melissa grew up knowing that she was adopted and loved, she didn't find out the truth about being an abortion survivor until she was 14 years old. Needless to say, finding out the truth about her life changed her forever, and now the world also. Melissa, ultimately, went searching for answers about her survival and her biological family, and since 2007, she has had contact with both sides of her biological family in varying degrees. Fr. Cameron's Message



Dear Holy Redeemer Parishioners,

As many of you know, Fr. Michael and I found ourselves in an unexpected and alarming situation last weekend. On Wednesday June 29, we received word about a protest at Peninsula Park that intended to target our church for vandalism. This came from a parishioner, Tom Markgraf, who was in conversation with the local police, the sheriff's office, and the FBI. At the time, our local law enforcement also admitted that they did not have the resources and personnel to guarantee a rapid response or a nearby presence if/when we were targeted. All we had was the information, leaving us to quickly discern what our community might do to protect our place of worship from being vandalized, while also being careful not to place anyone in danger. Our flock-note messages sent to the parish via email on Wednesday and Thursday night offered a glimpse of the back -and-forth in our attempts to form an appropriate plan of action, considering the magnitude of the crisis. Part of these efforts included encouraging people to contact the mayor's office to express concern, and Fr. Michael also hired a group of security guards at his own cost—a decision made when we were still planning a night of prayer and vigilance in which parishioners could participate.

Friday afternoon was filled with a flurry of activity. John Baggenstos (parish facilities manager) oversaw an effort to board up the entire front entrance to the church, while others worked on securing behind more locked doors anything inside of the church that could be broken or destroyed. This was a community effort, aided by our visiting summer seminarians and several parishioners, including some students and alumni of Holy Redeemer school. In the mean-time news cameras from KATU, KGW, and KOIN, and two reporters from the Oregonian stopped by to get footage of the situation and to interview Fr. Michael (again, thanks to Tom Markgraf and others who brought this story to the media attention).

The protest did take place on Friday night, and involved some destruction (People busted the windows of a vacant coffee shop on Albina Ave across from the park). However, the presence of local law enforcement was strong and the police were swift to start dispersing the march after the first acts of vandalism. The first sounds that I heard floating towards the Church campus were not of chanting rioters, but of police bullhorns, declaring an unlawful assembly and ordering people to disperse. Protesters did arrive at the Church soon afterwards, but they did not have enough time here to do damage. However, in the chaos, one protester struck a reporter and another tried to steal a different reporter's camera.

Thank you to all who agreed to join for prayer and vigilance at the Church, and thank you also for staying home to pray when our plans changed course. Thank you to those made a call to the mayor's office. It is clear that we would not have had this same police presence had it not been for the many voices from this community that made themselves heard. My hope is that over time, our Portland community reaches the point where all can depend on this sort of response to senseless destruction without having to explicitly ask for it. In the meantime, we must continue to pray for peace, in our world, in our city, and in our hearts.
