Pastor's Message

Dear friends,

Now that we are finally emerging from many of the pandemic restrictions, one way of celebrating is by resuming Fr. Michael's exposition on our stained glass windows. Here is the eighth installment of Fr. Michael Belinsky's exposition on our stained glass windows. Enjoy! Fr. Pat

The final window on the West Wall: "The Sacred Heart of Jesus"

This window is located within the sanctuary, left of the altar and left of the icon of Our Mother of Perpetual Help.

The full image is the Lord Jesus, gazing upon us in love. The focus is upon his heart, a ruby-red heart encircled by thorns but crowned by a flame. This image shows the fullness of the love Jesus has for us, even amidst his suffering and passion, the fire of His love burns continually for us. He is clothed as a priest, recalling the instructions of the Old Testament. His belt has 5 precious stones; he's not barefoot but wears sandals. Seen in the lower left corner of this window is a cluster of ripe grapes on the vine. This fruit, used to make wine, points to the Eucharist and the Precious Blood of Christ. The Eucharist is the continuation of the mystery of the Cross and the fulfillment of God's love for us in Christ.

The inscription reads: "Sacred Heart of Jesus, have mercy on us." St. Margaret Mary Alacoque, St. Catherine of Siena and many others have fostered this devotion. From the Preface to the Eucharistic Prayer for the Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, we hear "For raised up high on the Cross, he gave himself up for us with a wonderful love and poured out blood and water from his pierced side, the wellspring of the Church's Sacraments."

Middle left - an Anchor Cross as seen in another previous window. An anchor was regarded as a symbol of safety and unwavering steadfastness. Early Christians adopted the anchor as a symbol of hope in future existence. For Christians, Christ is the unfailing hope of all who believe in him.

Bottom - the Cross in Glory. The cross is a sign of the Death and Resurrection of Jesus Christ and it is bathed in the glory of the emanating ray of light from a sunburst.

Lower right - a radiant Sun with the initials: IHC - the sun with it's shooting rays suggest the Sun of Righteousness (Malachi 4:2). The circle of the sun denotes eternity with the initials of the Eternal Son for the name of Jesus in Greek: "IHCOYC."

Upper right - a golden crown and cross. These symbolize the reward of those who steadfastly believe in the crucified Savior. "Remain faithful until death and I will give you the crown of life" (Rev. 2:10).

Beneath it - two intertwined palm branches. Palms are always associated with the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem, which we recall each Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord.

The top of this image of Jesus shows a domed building, possibly an image of the Church. The Church is known as the People of God, the Body of Christ, and the temple of the Holy Spirit. In all of these images, taken from the mystery of the Holy Trinity and from Scripture, we reflect upon the foundation of our faith in the one true God of whom Jesus bears God's face.
