Fr. Paul's Message



Dear Holy Redeemer,

In some way suffering ceases to be suffering at the moment it finds a meaning, such as the meaning of a sacrifice. – Viktor Frankl

Doctor Viktor Frankl was a Holocaust survivor. In his book *Man's Search for Meaning,* he describes in detail the tragic loss of human life that transpired in the concentration camps of Nazi Germany. Personally, he was stripped of all possessions: family, property, even his very work was taken from him.

Dr. Frankl had one last possession hidden on his person when he arrived at Auschwitz. A manuscript, a work of untold hours, a creative act he hoped to publish if he survived. With the seizing of his clothing, the manuscript was taken as well. Naked, inspected, and deemed suitable for work, he was given the tattered attire of a man who had just been sent off to the gas chambers.

Dr. Frankl found in a worn-out pocket a small slip of paper, his new possession, a page torn out of a Hebrew prayer book containing the most important Jewish prayer: Shema Yisrael. Here is the beginning of the prayer translated:

Hear, O Israel, the Lord is our God, the Lord is One.

Blessed be the name of the glory of His kingdom forever and ever.

You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your might. And these words which I command you today shall be upon your heart. . .

A faithful Jew will not only pray this prayer everyday morning and evening; he will live it. It is the first prayer taught to a Jewish child and it is the last prayer said at the time of death. Dr. Frankl thought that he was being challenged not just to write about life's meaning, but to live a meaningful life. A life not bound by circumstance. We may suffer, we may prosper, but to what end did we serve in our life? How did we treat others? How did we live?

Jesus in the Gospel poses a conundrum of sorts. Using a parable of a field of wheat, he speaks of the problem of weeds. It is an allegory of the problem of evil. He makes clear that all will be harvested, but in the end the weeds, that which is evil, will be dealt with, separated out to be burned. Upon hearing this parable, a series of questions may come to mind.

Can I trust God to bring about justice, or better yet, can I view my suffering at the hands of the careless and cruel as a sacrifice? Who am I really in relationship with, the weeds? or the God who harvests? Who is my God today, to whom do I give my daily labor to? What is the meaning of my life?

The answers to these questions are the difference between a wasted existence and an eternity in the communion of saints.
