

HOLY REDEEMER'S SVDP CONFERENCE:

"Giving help and hope one person at a time." The Society of St. Vincent de Paul was founded by a small group of students in Paris in 1835 and now stretches across the globe. Its namesake and patron saint was a sixteenth century priest from Pouy, France who became known as the "Father of the Poor." The Society was unique for its time in that it was formed by lay Catholics, and it offered charity to foreigners as well as non-

Catholics. A truly Christian enterprise! Our conference at Holy Redeemer seeks to reflect this Vincentian spirit through our rent and utility assistance program as well as a food pantry, all staffed and funded entirely through volunteers. Our pantry receives food from the parish as well as partner agencies such as the Oregon Food Bank, Safeway, and Nite Hawk Cafe & Lounge. Each conference is governed by a Board of Directors which includes a spiritual advisor and is overseen by the Portland District Council www.svdppdx.org. Meetings take place in the Rectory on the second and fourth Tuesdays of every month at 6:30 PM and by Zoom. All parishioners are invited, and volunteers are encouraged to attend. Father Michael's Message

Happy Pentecost Sunday! Happy 50th Day of Easter!

"Pentecost" is the Greek name for a festival known in the Old Testament as the Feast of Weeks (<u>Leviticus 23:15</u>; <u>Deuteronomy 16:9</u>). The Greek word means "fifty" and refers to the fifty days that have elapsed since the wave offering of grain of Passover. The Feast of Weeks celebrated the end of the grain harvest. Most interesting, however, is its use in Joel and Acts. Looking back to Joel's prophecy (<u>Joel 2:28–32</u>) and forward to the promise of the Holy Spirit in Christ's last words on earth before His ascension into heaven (<u>Acts 1:8</u>), Pentecost signals the beginning of the church age.

In the Bible, we read about Pentecost in <u>Acts 2:1–3</u>. Pentecost reminds us of the Last Supper where, in both, the disciples are together for what proves to be an important event. At the Last Supper, the disciples witness the end of the Messiah's earthly ministry as He asks them to remember Him after His death until He returns. At Pentecost, the disciples witness the birth of the church in the coming of the Holy Spirit to dwell in all who believe. So, the scene of the disciples in a room at Pentecost links the beginning of the Holy Spirit's work through the church with the conclusion of Christ's earthly ministry in the upper room before the crucifixion.

Fire and wind in the Pentecost account echo throughout the Bible. The sound of the wind at Pentecost was "rushing" and "mighty." Scriptural references to the power of wind (always understood to be under God's control) abound. Look at Exodus 10:13; Psalm 18:42 and Isaiah 11:15 in the Old Testament and Matthew 14:23–32 in the New Testament. More significant than "wind as power" is "wind as life" in Job 12:10 and as spirit in John 3:8. Just as the first Adam received the breath of physical life in Genesis 2:7 so the last Adam, Jesus, brings the breath of spiritual life.

Fire is often associated in the Old Testament with the presence of God (<u>Exodus 3:2</u>; <u>13:21–22</u>; <u>24:17</u>; <u>Isaiah 10:17</u>) and with holiness (<u>Psalm 97:3</u>; <u>Malachi 3:2</u>). Likewise, in the New Testament, fire is associated with the presence of God (<u>Hebrews 12:29</u>) and the purification God brings about in human life (<u>Revelation 3:18</u>). God's presence and holiness are implied in the Pentecostal tongues of fire. Indeed, fire is identified with Christ Himself (<u>Revelation 1:14</u>; <u>19:12</u>); this association naturally underlies the Pentecost gift of the Holy Spirit, who would teach the disciples the things of Christ (<u>John 16:14</u>).

Another aspect of the Day of Pentecost is the miraculous speaking in foreign tongues which enabled people from various language groups to understand the message of the apostles. In addition is the bold and incisive preaching of Peter to a Jewish audience. The effect of the sermon was powerful, as listeners were "cut to the heart" (Acts 2:37) and instructed by Peter to "repent and be baptized" (Acts 2:38). The story ends with three thousand being added to the fellowship where the breaking of bread and prayers, apostolic signs and wonders, and a community existed to give God glory. Alleluia!
