## Pastor's Message



Dear Friends:

When I was a freshman at Notre Dame, I attended a Tenebrae Service at the Basilica of the Sacred Heart. I had no idea what it was all about. I learned that "Tenebrae" is Latin for "darkness." This service, cele-

brated during Holy Week, features a candelabra, and as readings are read, the candles are gradually extinguished until only one remains burning. A candle bearer then takes the candle away in procession to a place where it cannot be seen. In the darkness, we were instructed to hit the pews with our song book or hands to make a loud noise. I was told it was reminiscent of the earthquake that struck at the moment of Jesus' death on the cross, but it was also a pleading for Christ our light to return. Slowly, the candle bearer returns and gently places the candle in its place. In silence, we departed.

I then remember attending the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday evening. It was so popular that you had to arrive an hour early to secure a good seat. From our pews, we could see the flames of the Easter fire at the entrance of the church, and then a lone light entered the church enveloped in darkness. It was the Paschal candle, the symbol of Christ, our light, who triumphed over the darkness of sin and death. And with each successive chant of "Light of Christ," the light of Christ was shared with each of us as we lit our tapered candles. Then the powerful hymn of praise known as the *Exultet* was chanted in the darkness softened by the glow of hundreds of lit candles.

We have been through a period of deep darkness since this time last year. Some of the darkness has been beyond our human control: the pandemic and the many people who have suffered or died because of it, or the wildfires that ravaged our region. We have also witnessed human darkness in the form of racism, homelessness, political intolerance, or the storming of our Nation's Capitol Building. And each of us have experienced some inner darkness in the form of lone-liness, isolation, anxiety, depression, loss, or constant stress.

Holy Week is an invitation to turn our eyes away from the world's darkness towards the light of Christ. As stated in the Prologue of the Gospel of John, "What came to be through him was life, and this life was the light of the human race; the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." (John 1: 3b) May this light dispel the darkness of our hearts and enlighten us at Easter. For Christ not only said, "I am the light of the world." He also said, "You are the light of the world." We are each called to carry the light of Christ to all who live in darkness.
