HOLY REDEEMER'S SVDP CONFERENCE :

"Giving help and hope one person at a time." The Society of St. Vincent de Paul was founded by a small group of students in Paris in 1835 and now stretches across the globe. Its namesake and patron saint was a sixteenth century priest from Pouy, France who became known as the "Father of the Poor." The Society was unique for its time in that it was formed by lay Catholics, and it offered charity to foreigners as well as non-

Catholics. A truly Christian enterprise! Our conference at Holy Redeemer seeks to reflect this Vincentian spirit through our rent and utility assistance program as well as a food pantry, all staffed and funded entirely through volunteers. Our pantry receives food from the parish as well as partner agencies such as the Oregon Food Bank, Safeway, and Nite Hawk Cafe & Lounge. Each conference is governed by a Board of Directors which includes a spiritual advisor and is overseen by the Portland District Council <u>www.svdppdx.org</u>. Meetings take place in the Rectory on the second and fourth Tuesdays of every month at 6:30 PM and by Zoom. All parishioners are invited, and volunteers are encouraged to attend. 

Growing in Faith



Pastor's Message



Dear Friends:

As you read this bulletin column, I will actually be on my annual retreat. In Holy Cross, our Constitutions mandate that we should have an annual retreat of 8 days duration, if possible.

I remember that when I first joined Holy Cross in 1981, that I had no idea what it meant to go on a retreat. The closest thing I had to a retreat experience would have

been our monthly campouts with my Scout troop back in Northern Indiana. I so looked forward to them as they afforded time in the silence and beauty of nature, time spent sitting around a campfire, and simply being with friends away from the normal routine of daily life.

What happens on a typical retreat? First of all, it's about unplugging. I set my email so that people know I'm away on retreat. The phone only gets checked twice a day in case there is something urgent that I need to be aware of but it's generally always in airplane mode. The idea is to enter into stillness where God can more easily speak to the heart.

Realistically, the first few days are about resting and easing into the retreat, because too often there is accumulated fatigue and it is difficult to enter more deeply into prayer when you are tired. It is such a grace just to slow down, and to realize that there are no meetings to attend, no phone calls to make, and no place to be.

The one book I must have at my side is the Bible, because believe or not I don't get as much time to spend praying with Scripture as I would like. I also usually include one good spiritual book and maybe even a book of classical literature for leisure reading during meals. Reading, for me, is a form of prayer.

It is a good time to write in my journal because most nights I'm too tired to write in it. It allows me to record any insights or promptings that may come to me in prayer, especially if I'm needing to discern about some important matter.

There is also time each day for walks along nature trails, with more time to simply be out in nature and take in all the beauty around me. All the better if there is a passing thunderstorm or if I'm up early enough to watch the sunrise. I find that being in nature helps still the mind and allows me to connect with the beauty of all created things.

Prayer for me is not about lots of words or striving for mystical insights or enlightenment. It is simply being still in the presence of God, and all the better when I'm praying in a chapel before the Blessed Sacrament. I guess it's about a love affair with God and renewing my friendship with Christ Jesus and his mother, Mary, especially through the rosary.

We all deserve a time of retreat to simply be in the presence of God. It helps us see the big picture once again, to be reminded of what makes for true happiness, and to give thanks for countless blessings. It also gives us renewed strength to continue the journey and to carry out our unique mission as disciples on this good earth. Know that I will be lifting you up in prayer and I so appreciate your ongoing prayers for me, for Fr. Michael, and for Fr. Cameron.
