HOLY REDEEMER'S SVDP CONFERENCE

"Giving help and hope one person at a time." The Society of St. Vincent de Paul was founded by a small group of students in Paris in 1835 and now stretches across the globe. Its namesake and patron saint was a sixteenth century priest from Pouy, France who became known as the "Father of the Poor." The Society was unique for its time in that it was formed by lay Catholics, and it offered charity to foreigners as well as non-Catholics. A truly Christian enterprise! Our

conference at Holy Redeemer seeks to reflect this Vincentian spirit through our rent and utility assistance program as well as a food pantry, all staffed and funded entirely through volunteers. Our pantry receives food from the parish as well as partner agencies such as the Oregon Food Bank, Safeway, and Nite Hawk Cafe & Lounge. Each conference is governed by a Board of Directors which includes a spiritual advisor and is overseen by the Portland District Council www.svdppdx.org. 

Fr. Cameron's Message



THE WORLD DAY OF THE POOR AND THE CATHOLIC CAMPAIGN OR HUMAN DEVELOPMENT

This past Saturday, I was blessed to join a group of dedicated parishioners and 12 teens in our confirmation program out on the streets near Delta Park. There we set up a serving station for offering a hot meal, a steaming cup of coffee and a small selection of donated clothing to people in the area living in tents or in their cars. We are bringing all of our confirmation teens to participate in this ministry over this weekend and the next, because meeting face-to-face with people experiencing poverty cultivates in all of us a deeper sense of solidarity. That is, an appreciation of how our interconnectedness in the human race binds us all together as brothers and

sisters and calls us to work for one another's well-being in spite of our differences.

The call to develop our sense of solidarity with the poor is one that Pope Francis has issued to the whole Church on the occasion of this sixth annual **World Day of the Poor** (this weekend). His message for today is themed around 2 Corinthians 8:9, "You know the generous act of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich."

Jesus is for us the model of solidarity, *par excellence*. These words of St. Paul are true in a metaphysical sense—the Son of God, a divine person possessing all power, knowledge and perfection, became poor by taking on our lowly human nature and entering into solidarity with all of us. But if we look at the concrete details of Jesus' life, we can see that he also became 'poor' according to our more common use of the term as well. Born in a stable to parents currently being displaced by political turmoil; experienced life as a refugee in Egypt as an infant; and in adulthood, voluntarily left his stable home and job in order to walk from town to town as he preached about the kingdom of God, relying on the generosity and hospitality of others for his needs and survival. Jesus in every way made himself poor so that we might become rich. And St. Paul used this significant truth about our Lord's life to call the Christians at Corinth to a greater sense of solidarity with those among them suffering want: *I do not mean there should be relief for others and pressure on you, but it is a question of a fair balance between your present abundance and their need.*

In our country, the US bishops have coordinated their annual Campaign for Human Development to also fall on this weekend. This campaign has existed now for a little over a half a century. And while the Catholic Church has long housed many charitable organizations dedicated to relief and aid for the poor, this effort in particular is aimed towards providing grants to grass-roots, community-organized endeavors to address the root causes of poverty. It was born out of the Civil Rights movement, a time when the entire nation's conscience was being stirred to face head-on deep systemic issues plaguing our society that kept people in poverty and states of exclusion and oppression. In recent years the grants have helped various community groups and organizations that empower migrants and refugees, people with intellectual disabilities struggling to find work, homeless individuals, and young women dealing with unexpected crisis pregnancies. The Simone Weil Catholic worker house—whose members are parishioners here—have also received some of this grant money in the past, to help them support guest residents in their community as they transition from houselessness.

I am aware that this is the second special collection being asked of us in a span of two weeks, but I invite us all to pray on how we each are called to give from our present abundance, to live in solidarity with the poor, and to keep ever before us the example of Jesus Christ, who became poor so that we all might be made rich.

Go forth and be witnesses to God's love in Jesus Christ!
