

CELEBRATING DOROTHY DAY'S VISION: MINISTERING TO HOMELESS YOUTH IN PORTLAND



Pastor's Message



Dear Friends:

When I was a boy, I could not wait for Halloween. We loved having a different costume every year and, of course, trick or treating and coming home with a bag full of candy, much of which was consumed that very night! Deep down there was something so good about families opening their homes to children they did not know and blessing them with their favorite candies. I had to smile recently when I read that one quarter of all candy sold annually in the United States is purchased for Halloween.

One thing we never learned was the religious origins of Halloween. Hallow, in Old English, means "holy" or "sacred." Therefore, "Hallows' Eve," or "Halloween" simply means "the evening of holy persons" and refers to the evening before All Saints Day. Halloween has ancient roots in Celtic religious beliefs and Christian martyrology.

During his reign (731-741 AD), Pope Gregory III established the current date of November 1 for All Saints Day when he dedicated a chapel in Rome's St. Peter's Basilica in honor of all saints. While this celebration was originally limited to Rome, later in 837 Pope Gregory IV ordered the official observance of All Saints Day every November and extended its celebration to the entire Church.

Despite some modern concerns about the pagan origins of Halloween, the potential pagan associations with Halloween were not a source of concern for Christians in earlier times. Halloween's association with Catholic saints and the Catholic calendar was of more concern for early Protestants. It was for this reason that the celebration of All Hallowed Eve and All Saints Day were outlawed in post-Reformation England.

Our core belief is that there is a Communion of Saints and that we, the living, are intimately connected to the saints who constantly intercede for us. It is fitting that most years All Saints Day is a holy day of obligation (except when it falls on a Saturday or on a Monday in the U.S.), for it is at the Eucharist that we are most directly connected to the saints.

In Mexico, there is a traditional celebration of "Día de los Muertos," or "Day of the Dead" on November 1 and 2, which has pagan roots, but was subsequently Christianized. It is a time for families to visit and decorate the graves of loved ones and to spend time there. In olden times, families might spend the entire night in the cemetery.

Let us give thanks for all the saints, those great saints known to the universal church, those more obscure saints that we will only come to know in heaven, and for the humble saints we have all known in our lifetimes. They are lights shining in the darkness and they are trustworthy guides, pointing out to us the way that leads to God, despite the many challenges we face in life.

Now it is our turn to become saints. As St. Therese of Lisieux put it, "Begin now. Believe me, don't wait until tomorrow to begin becoming a saint."
