HOLY REDEEMER'S SVDP CONFERENCE

"Giving help and hope one person at a time." The Society of St. Vincent de Paul was founded by a small group of students in Paris in 1835 and now stretches across the globe. Its namesake and patron saint was a sixteenth century priest from Pouy, France who became known as the "Father of the Poor." The Society was unique for its time in that it was formed by lay Catholics, and it offered charity to foreigners as well as non-Catholics. A truly Christian enterprise! Our conference at Holy Redeemer seeks to reflect this Vincentian spirit through our

rent and utility assistance program as well as a food pantry, all staffed and funded entirely through volunteers. Our pantry receives food from the parish as well as partner agencies such as the Oregon Food Bank, Safeway, and Nite Hawk Cafe & Lounge. Each conference is governed by a Board of Directors which includes a spiritual advisor and is overseen by the Portland District Council www.svdppdx.org. VOLUNTEERS FOR MONTHLY MEAL SERVICE AT ST. ANDRE BESSETTE DOWNTOWN

Our Holy Redeemer Conference of St. Vincent de Paul will again be providing a monthly meal service at St. Andre Bessette downtown, in their commercial kitchen. The time commitment is typically less than 4 hours a month and Holy Redeemer Catholic School Fair Share Hours are available to school families that participate.

Holy Redeemer will be hosting the second Fridays of the month, starting in October and our goal is to form a team of about 8 volunteers. Anyone with experience in restaurants/food carts to help coordinate the preparation, packaging and distribution of the to-go meals would be very appreciated.

The Pastor of St. Andre Bessette will provide an orientation for our volunteers on our first Friday and will explain any safety concerns to help everyone feel confident and assured that clients can be served with dignity and respect. Volunteers will need to be comfortable with using stairs in the work space.

Work starts with the meal preparation 3:00- 4:00pm followed by serving the meal and then of course clean up. At this point, the meals are boxed "to-go" with hopes of moving to "stay and eat "dining room service in the future.



Fr. Pat's Message



Dear Friends:

Today is World Day of Migrants and Refugees in the universal Catholic Church, which concludes National Migration Week, which began on September 19. It is an invitation by the United States Bishops to encounter and reflect on the circumstances of migrants, refugees, victims of human trafficking, and others.

On June 19, I arrived in Rome for the General Chapter of the Congregation of Holy Cross. It was a Sunday morning, and since our rooms were not yet ready where we were staying, some of my East African and Chilean Holy Cross friends invited me to accompany them for the Angelus with Pope Francis at the Vatican. When we entered St. Peter's Square, we saw a marvelous large bronze sculpture entitled, "Angels Unaware," which depicts 140 migrants ranging from a Jewish man escaping Nazi Germany to Syrian refugees feeling the civil war.

It occurred to me that there is not any better title for such a sculpture, or one that offers a more fitting lens through which to understand the people who are migrants and refugees.

Our own parish is blessed by the presence of immigrants from a number of countries, and the largest single Mass we have on Sundays is our Spanish Mass. Each of our immigrant families has a story to tell, and some still wrestle with the insecurity that comes with being undocumented immigrants. What is clear to me, and what I wish them to know, is that they are our brothers and sisters, angels unaware, and a gift and a blessing to our parish family.

What pains me is to see that migrants and refugees have been transported by some governors to northern states in response to the border crisis. Ahead of National Migration Week, the Florida Conference of Catholic Bishops (FCCB) called reports of the state's involvement in transporting migrants to Martha's Vineyard "disconcerting."

"Any action to transport persons under false pretenses and leave them stranded with no assistance, if this proves to be the case, fails to respect their human dignity and objectifies them," the group said in a statement to CNA. "Immigration is not just a political issue, but a fundamental human and moral issue. For immigrants are not faceless numbers – but human persons," the statement adds. "They are our brothers and sisters."

A spokesperson for the Texas Catholic Conference of Bishops, Jennifer Allmon, stated that "Our nation's unwillingness to address the broken immigration system over these past several years rests squarely on citizens and politicians of both major political parties. This polarization has brought us to a moment of crisis; there exists a legitimate concern that without each level of government discharging their respective responsibilities, the common good of the communities of our towns, state, and nation, and immigrants themselves, will continue to suffer grievously." She recognized "an urgent need for legitimate and moral reform of our system of immigration and asylum."

As a country founded on principles of liberty and justice for all, as a nation of immigrants, we need elected officials who can cross the political divide to reform our system of immigration and asylum. May they keep at heart that migrants and refugees add a quality of life wherever they go through their cultures and talents, and the jobs they assume to serve us all and which contribute to the common good of our nation.
